

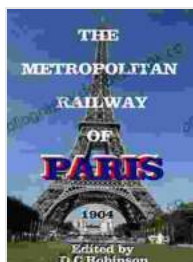
The Metropolitan Railway of Paris 1904: A Journey Through Time

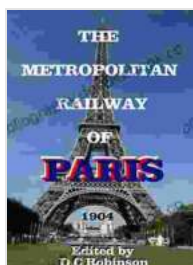
